

Why Did You Stop at Verse 8, Pastor?

You may remember that on Easter, I noted that Mark suddenly ended his Gospel at 16:8: "They went out and fled from the tomb, for trembling and astonishment had gripped them; and they said nothing to anyone, for they were afraid." You may see that there is indeed a verse 9, along with verses 10-20. *That's not an abrupt ending, Pastor. You forgot to keep reading!* you may think. But there are reasons I stopped at verse 8 that Sunday.

If you open your modern translation (like the NASB, ESV, or NKJV) of your Bible to Mark 16:9, you'll notice there is a footnote, maybe with brackets, for verses 9-20. The footnote at the bottom of your page gives a qualification for verses 9-20 that they are not found in early manuscripts. In contrast, in your King James Bible of Mark 16, it simply includes verses 9-20 as part of the Bible text without any such qualification. Why would they change the text in the modern translations, if the King James Version (and probably most versions before that) included these verses?

Looking at this issue of Mark 16:9-20 is a good practice to introduce you to how our Bible was compiled, and we will focus specifically on the New Testament, and Mark 16. Understand that the first edition of the King James was published in 1611, and it became the most popular Bible in the United States. This Bible's New Testament, along with any other Bible, is a translation from Greek, the original language the New Testament was written in. You may wonder, so this is the Greek Bible Matthew, Mark, Paul, and John wrote in? No, it isn't. They didn't get together to compile a Bible, but rather wrote books and letters largely independent of one another. We don't have their original letters and books that they wrote.

So, what does this Greek Bible depend on? It depends upon copies. Matthew's, Mark's, Paul's and John's letters and books were copied by hand, by the church, when their books and letters were identified as valuable teachings to Christians. Over 5,000 of these copies of New Testament books still exist today! Some are complete, including Matthew through Revelation, while some are small, only including a couple verses.

Some are old, one estimated to be copied back in 125 AD, while some are "new," closer to 1,000 AD. Some were discovered in Egypt, some in Europe, some elsewhere. Some are more important than others, and that depends on each manuscript's age, location, and other factors. Comparing these manuscripts to one another, they largely match, but there are differences. When there are differences in one verse, for example, scholars ask questions like, what do a majority of the manuscripts read on this verse? Which of these manuscripts is the oldest and most reliable, and how does that one read, and how do others differ from it? By comparing up the manuscripts, they discover the original text Matthew, Mark, Paul, and John wrote.

Let me tell you a story about one manuscript. In 1844, German biblical scholar Konstantin von Tischendorf traveled to the traditional site of Mount Sinai, to St. Catherine's monastery. To his surprise, the monks there were housing a complete Greek Bible manuscript. This manuscript, now known as Codex Sinaiticus, is one of the most important discoveries for Biblical research. It is estimated that this copy was produced in the fourth century AD, making it an old and reliable manuscript of the Bible. One interesting observation of this manuscript is that it does not include Mark 16:9-20! Yes, it stops at verse 8. Newer manuscripts include verses 9-20, so it appears that a person copying Mark was not satisfied with the ending as presented in Codex Sinaiticus, so they added what we now know as verses 9-20. When the King James Version was translated in 1611, the translators did not have access to Codex Sinaiticus, which was discovered in 1844. The King James Version is a great translation, but since then, we have found more manuscripts, and some of these are older and more reliable. These many manuscripts, like Codex Sinaiticus, help sharpen our current Bibles to match with utmost precision what Matthew, Mark, Paul, and John


Lastly, 2023 brings the 50th Anniversary of United Free. If you are interested contributing to the celebration, please let me know.

Encouragement to overcome barriers that keep you from connecting


