Two Types of People

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	Unbelievers (World)	Believers (Church)
Eph. 2	"dead in your trespasses and sins" following Satan (vv. 1-2)	"because of His great love with which He loved usmade us alive together with Christ" (vv.4-5)
John 3	"That which is born of the flesh is flesh" (v. 6)	"and that which is born of the Spirit is spirit." (v. 6)

The consequence of works from unbelief: Isaiah 64:6; Jeremiah 2:13

Mortal and Venial Sins

Mortal Sin: "Sins that expel the Holy Spirit and bring spiritual death." "Mortal" is from Latin for "death."

Venial Sin: "Sins that Christians commit without losing the Holy Spirit. They are sins of weakness or rashness and are sometimes called the 'daily sins' of Christians." From Latin for "forgiveness." **Is there biblical evidence?** See 1 John 5:16-17 and Matthew 12:31-32.

	Mortal Sin	Venial Sin
Who?	Only can be committed by unbeliever	Only can be committed by believer
Who?	Committed by comfortable sinners and so-called "righteous"	Committed by uncomfortable sinners
Apparent good works	All of an unbeliever's "good" works are mortal sins. What is "good" in various degrees to the world is actually wholly evil to God.	Luther: "The works of the righteous would be mortal sins if they would not be feared as mortal sins by the righteous themselves out of pious fear of God." (see endnote 3) See Proverbs 1:7, Luke 17:7-10, Matthew 6:1-6

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All sins would be mortal if it were not for Jesus Christ.
